Many thanks to everyone who filled a Christmas shoe box for Blythswood - we had more than ever this year! And particular thanks to Dorothy Gautier, who took all of our boxes up to Blairgowrie (our local collection point for Blythswood) at the beginning of November, to get them started on their journey to some of Europe's poorest people; the boxes mostly go to children and elderly people in Eastern Europe and the Balkan countries. It is so good to think that our boxes will bring a wee bit of cheer to people who are struggling to keep warm!

Another way for us, as a congregation, to support folk who are worse off than ourselves is through the Church of Scotland's annual Stamp Appeal - billed on the Kirk's website as 'an easy way for your congregation to get involved in the world mission work of the church.'

And it really is easy! All you have to do is cut the stamps off any envelopes coming into your house over the next month or so, leaving about half-an-inch of paper all round the stamp, save them up in an envelope then pop them in a collection box in your local church where you see a poster like this one. \longrightarrow The money raised by this annual appeal always goes to help the work of the church overseas; this year, as last, it will support the Church in Malawi in establishing tree nurseries, with the long-term aims of providing employment, improving nutrition and combatting climate change. Please help if you can - everybody's stamps (put together) can raise a lot of money!



Now, here's a message from Diane Strachan, our congregational Treasurer, and it is for those of us who give to the church by Freewill Offering Envelopes, which are a great way to support your local church Sunday by Sunday.

Diane says, 'As we approach the end of the year, we are coming to the end of the Freewill Offering envelopes marked 'Ardler, Kettins and Meigle' and 'Glamis'.

Members at Newtyle who use the FWO envelope giving system will have some envelopes for early 2025 remaining. However, the new envelopes for Strathmore Parish Church will begin on the first Sunday of January, 2025.

If you donate to the church in this way, you will shortly receive your new envelopes for Strathmore Parish Church - **please use the new ones from Sunday, 5th January,** whether or not you have any envelopes left. The envelopes will be distributed in the manner which was previously used in your part of the parish.'

So, that sounds especially important for Newtyle envelope users - if you keep using the Newtyle envelopes after the New Year, there will be no way to record your giving, as we will all have different numbers in the new system!
